



# Electric co-ops discuss priorities

## as Iowa's 2026 Legislative Session begins

More than 150 senior staff and directors from Iowa electric cooperatives attended a legislative "welcome back" reception in Des Moines at the start of the 91st Iowa General Assembly January 13. At the event, co-op advocates discussed priorities face-to-face with their state legislators.

The Iowa Association of Electric Cooperatives (IAEC) hosted the reception in conjunction with the Iowa Biotechnology Association, the Iowa Communications Alliance, the Iowa Institute for Cooperatives and FUEL Iowa.

"Hosting this annual reception at the start of the legislative session is a way for Iowa electric cooperatives to form long-term relationships based on trust and open communication," remarked Leslie Kaufman, IAEC executive vice president. "With many new legislators and new faces in leadership this session, we value every opportunity to talk about the cooperative business model and the needs of our member-consumers."

Representatives from Iowa's locally owned electric cooperatives covered several important issues that could impact the

to provide retail electric service inside an established utility's service area, in direct conflict with service territory law.

In the coming months, Iowa's 91st General Assembly will be addressing a multitude of issues, including energy-related matters that are central to Iowa's rural economy. Iowa electric cooperatives will again be important advocates for a balanced approach in addressing energy issues as we work to power lives and empower communities.

Louscher Family Dentistry is proud to announce that two of its newest team members, Dr. Abby Thomas and Dr. Darrian Ward, have been selected for the Filling Iowa's Need for Dentists (FIND) program. Both recent graduates of the University of Iowa College of Dentistry, Dr. Thomas and Dr. Ward are committed to serving rural and underserved populations in North Central Iowa.

The FIND program is a collaborative effort to recruit and retain dentists in Iowa's rural communities. As program awardees, Dr. Thomas, who will primarily serve patients at Louscher's Algona location, and Dr. Ward, who will be based at the Emmetsburg office, will receive funding

assistance to help offset their dental school student loan payments.

A hallmark of the FIND program is the requirement of local matching funds, demonstrating the community's commitment to supporting new dentists. Several organizations and utility partners stepped forward to provide the necessary \$5,000 match for each dentist, totaling a \$10,000 investment in local dental care.

The contributors for both locations are as follows: Corn Belt Power, Iowa Lakes Electric, and the Iowa Area Development Group Community Foundation contributed \$2,000 each; Palo Alto Hospital, Emmetsburg Municipal Utilities, and Algona Municipal Utilities contributed \$1,000 each;

and Midland Power and Kossuth Area Development Group contributed \$500 each. The FIND awards for Dr. Thomas and Dr. Ward would not have been possible without this generous support.

## Corn Belt Power sees another sales record

For the fifth consecutive year, Corn Belt Power set a new sales record in 2025, delivering 2.181 billion kilowatt-hours to its member systems—an increase from 2.105 billion in 2024. Despite heating and cooling degree days aligning closely with previous record years, energy demand continues to rise across Corn Belt Power's system, a trend expected to persist in the coming years.

Through its load management program, Corn Belt Power helped member systems save just over \$4.4 million in 2025 by reducing demand during peak hours. This system delivers direct financial benefits to member cooperatives and the consumers they serve. A detailed breakdown of sales and performance will be presented at Corn Belt Power's annual meeting on April 8. ■

Eddie is a former world-class runner and gold medal winner for the USA Track & Field team. With a time of 3:58, he is the 169th American to run a mile in under four minutes.



## Clearance envelope for grain bins filled by permanently installed augers, conveyors or elevators


**P** = Probe clearance  
5.5m (18 ft) required by Rule 234F1a  
**H** = Horizontal clearance  
4.6m (15 ft) required by Rule 234F1b  
**T** = Transition clearance  
**V<sub>1</sub>** = Vertical clearance above a building required by Rule 234C  
**V<sub>2</sub>** = Vertical clearance required by Rule 232B



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## Clearance envelope for grain bins filled by portable augers, conveyors or elevators

### ELEVATION




**B** = Height of highest filling or probing port on grain bin  
**A** = **B** + 5.5m (18 ft)  
**D** = Variable horizontal dimension

In the area of sloped clearance, the vertical clearance is reduced by 300mm (1 ft) for each additional 450mm (1.5 ft) of horizontal distance from the grain bin.


